While America has focused on building fighter jets, missiles, and conventional warfighting capabilities, its three principal rivals—Russia, Iran, and China—have increasingly adopted <i>irregular</i> warfare: cyber attacks, the use of proxy forces, propaganda, espionage, and disinformation to undermine American power.</p>
	<p>The CCP is determined to win, while Australia looks the other way.</p> <p>From politics to culture, real estate to agriculture, universities to unions, and even in our primary schools, Hamilton uncovered compelling evidence of the Chinese Communist Party's infiltration of Australia. Sophisticated influence operations target Australia's elites, and parts of the large Chinese-Australian diaspora have been mobilised to buy access to politicians, limit academic freedom, intimidate critics, collect information for Chinese intelligence agencies, and protest in the streets against Australian government policy. It's no exaggeration to say the Chinese Communist Party and Australian democracy are on a collision course.</p>
	<p>The West's strategy of engagement with China has failed. Put simply, the democracies underestimated the resilience, resourcefulness, and ruthlessness of the Chinese Communist Party. For far too long, the United States and its allies failed to take seriously the Party's unwavering determination to crush opposition, build national power, and fulfill its ideological and geopolitical ambitions. In this timely and powerfully argued study, Aaron Friedberg identifies the assumptions underpinning engagement, describes the counterstrategy that China's Communist Party rulers devised in order to exploit the West's openness while defeating its plans, and explains what the democracies must do now if they wish to preserve their prosperity, protect their security, and defend their common values.</p>
	<p>The Improbable War explains why conflict between the USA and China cannot be ruled out. In 1914 war between the Great Powers was considered unlikely, yet it happened. We learn only from history, and popular though the First World War analogy is, the lessons we draw from its outbreak are usually mistaken. Among these errors is the tendency to over-estimate human rationality. All major conflicts of the past 300 years have been about the norms and rules of the international system. In China and the US the world confronts two "exceptional" powers whose values differ markedly, with China bidding to challenge the current order. To avoid stumbling into an avoidable war both Beijing and Washington need a coherent strategy, which neither of them has. The next global conflict is likely to be played out in cyberspace and outer space and like all previous wars it will have devastating consequences.</p>
